Transportation Fee Refund

This school year we have seen a significant decrease in yellow school bus ridership. This change is the result of a number of different factors such as families making different transportation choices due to the global pandemic, students moving to Hub online learning and the overall reduced student enrolment across the system.

This lower ridership has resulted in a decrease in the overall cost to operate yellow school buses. As a result, the CBE has an approximately \$9 million surplus in the transportation budget this year. **The decision was made to provide a full refund of transportation fees paid to all yellow school bus riders who were registered as of Feb. 28, 2021.**

Refunds will first be provided to those who made online payments, crediting the credit/debit card that was used for the original payment. These refunds will begin in May. Any refunds not able to be processed online or from another payment form will be sent as a cheque. These refunds will begin in late June.

Thank you for your patience through this process. There are no changes to noon supervision and other school fees. You are responsible for payment of outstanding balances for these fees.

We are currently reviewing fees and service levels for the 2021-22 school year and expect to make an announcement and launch transportation pre-registration in May.

Reminder | Waivers are Available

Families are reminded to regularly check their MyCBE/PowerSchool account as new fees are added throughout the school year. Fees are due when they appear in your account.

For families having difficulties paying the fees, there are several ways to qualify to be eligible for the fees to be waived based on income and unexpected family situations. The deadline for waiver applications is June 30, 2021. We encourage you to apply as soon as possible to allow time for your documents to be processed.

2021-22 Budget Information

The Calgary Board of Education is committed to advancing student success, safety, and sustainability in the ongoing development of its 2021-22 budget.

On March 31, school districts received their individual funding profiles from Alberta Education, following the government release of the [2021 budget](#) on Feb. 26. The government provided nearly the same funding for next school year as this school year. Stable and predictable funding helps the CBE deliver the best possible outcomes for students.

Using the detailed information from its funding profile, CBE Administration developed a Budget Assumption Report (BAR), which was presented to the Board of Trustees on April 6. The BAR lays out the assumptions Administration will use to build the 2021-22 budget.

Given a modest increase to Alberta Education funding, the CBE committed to delivering more money to schools through the Resource Allocation Method (RAM) in comparison to 2020-21. At the same time, the CBE continues to update its RAM formula in line with our focus on equity and ensuring all students succeed regardless of personal circumstance.

In early May, service units and schools will finalize their budgets. On May 18, the CBE's 2021-22 budget will be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval.

In keeping with legal requirements, a balanced budget will be submitted to Alberta Education before May 31.

Students Can Earn High School Credits for External Learning

Alberta Education has a new process to award high school credits for external learning opportunities that students take outside of school. This new process provides a more personalized, flexible approach for completing high school.

Students complete external courses offered by government-recognized organizations such as the Canadian Armed Forces or Lifesaving Society. They can earn up to five credits toward a high school credential by asking their school to have external courses approved by Alberta Education. Earned credits cannot substitute for courses required for an Alberta High School Diploma or Certificate of High School Achievement. When students take external learning, school authorities do not receive provincial funding for the credits.

While students initiate the request for credits, their school is responsible for following Alberta Education's processes for external course approval and awarding credits. Alberta Education will review the external learning opportunity and ensure the providing organization is fulfilling its responsibilities and meeting course requirements.
