1 | Recommendation

It is recommended:

THAT the Board of Trustees approves the 2015-16 budget for the Office of the Board of Trustees of \$1,285,598 to be reasonable to allow the Board to effectively and efficiently perform its governing responsibilities.

2 | Issue

The Chief Superintendent is required by Operational Expectation 5 subsection 5.7 to develop a budget that includes amounts determined by the Board to be necessary for the Board to effectively and efficiently perform its governing responsibilities.



3 | Background

The Office of the Board of Trustees' budget for 2014-15 was approved at \$1,515,403.

The Chief Superintendent prepared a report regarding the 2015-16 budget for the Office of the Board of Trustees that incorporates the budget assumptions as they relate to the Office of the Board of Trustees' budget and reflects the outcome of any decisions related to the Board's consideration of Trustee Remuneration.

The Board of Trustees have passed the following motions which have implications for the Office of the Board of Trustees Operating Expense Budget, for the 2015-16 fiscal year:

The Board has reviewed the honoraria for 2015-16 in April 2015 and it will remain same as the existing remuneration policy. The Board of Trustees has approved, as recommended by the Trustee Remuneration Committee, an ongoing formula to address trustee honoraria based on an average of the Statistics Canada annual published Calgary Consumer Price Index. This change will be in effect as of September 1, 2016. Remuneration for 2015-16 remains unchanged at:

Trustees:	\$45,000
Chair:	An additional \$10,000
Vice-Chair:	An additional \$5,000

 GC-2E states that at the end of each Trustee's service, each Trustee shall be entitled to a retiring allowance based on the number of terms completed. As such, the annual retirement accrual will be calculated as follows, if service ends after:

First term:	\$1,731
Completion of two or more terms:	\$3,895

Once the maximum amount has been accrued for a Trustee, no further annual provisions are budgeted.

 The Board of Trustees has approved that the amount allocated for individual trustee professional development be reduced from \$4,000 to \$2,000 annually. The proposed budget has reallocated \$2,000 from each individual Trustee's professional development allotment to a general business travel & PD account.

The Board has also requested the following budget changes:

 The Audit Fees budget to reflect an increase of the following charges to resource the full cost of the annual financial audit

Post-employment benefit valuation	\$34,900

 The general professional & technical services budget to reflect a change in proposed use of contracted services. The dollars have been consolidated into one General and Contracted out Services account, with an overall reduction of \$14,000 Other changes to reduce overall costs

1 | Recommendation

It is recommended:

 THAT this 2015-16 Interim Budget be approved as presented and submitted to Alberta Education, as required.



2 | Issue

Section 147(2) of the *School Act* requires that the Calgary Board of Education submit to Alberta Education, by May 31 of each year, a budget for the fiscal year beginning on the following September 1.

In accordance with the Board of Trustees' Operational Expectation OE-5: Financial Planning, the Chief Superintendent shall develop and maintain a multi-year financial plan that is related directly to the Board's Results priorities and Operational Expectations goals, and that avoids long-term fiscal jeopardy to the organization.

3 | Background

In accordance with the *School Act* and the intent of Operational Expectation OE 5: Financial Planning, the Chief Superintendent is required to prepare and submit to the Board of Trustees, for review and approval, a budget which is balanced, so that the proposed expenses do not exceed the projected revenues to be received by the Calgary Board of Education or from other identified funding sources such as reserves or unrestricted net assets.

This 2015-16 Interim Budget is based upon assumptions provided to the Board of Trustees for information on April 14, 2015 (based on the previous government's Budget 2015 document) and adjusted for high-level assumptions related to the new government's budget. At this time there is a high level of uncertainty related to the new government's budget direction. The development of this interim budget was guided by the CBE's values:

- Students come first
- Learning is our central purpose
- Public education serves the common good

The interim budget is also influenced by the CBE's Mission, Alberta Education's *Inspiring Education*, and the CBE's Three Year Education Plan and the Board's summative evaluation of the Chief Superintendent.

4 | Analysis

On April 24, 2015, administration allocated amounts to schools for the 2015-16 school year, through the Resource Allocation Method (RAM). The RAM distribution begins the Spring Staffing process. The Spring Staffing process is one of the largest processes at the CBE and is the process by which schools are staffed for the beginning of the next school year. Lead time is necessary to ensure proper compliance with collective agreements. Resources were allocated to schools to fund growth and maintain 2014-15 class size, based on current projections.

On May 5, 2015, a new provincial government was elected by the citizens of Alberta. The CBE awaits budget direction from this new government. Until such time as direction is received, the CBE will maintain the current levels of operations while planning for the future, including the continuing of school planning and organization activities for next year. Future changes may include:

- The amounts and types of allocations provided to schools in the RAM.
- The amounts and types of services provided by Service Units.
- The fees charged to parents for Noon Supervision, Instructional Supplies and Materials and Transportation.
- Program and services related to changes to the School Act, and Inspiring Education, anticipated to be enacted for the 2015-16 school year.



The key highlights of the 2015-16 Interim Budget are:

- Funds allocated directly to schools via the Resource Allocation Method have increased year over year to maintain class sizes and fund growth, based on current projections, and subject to principal deployment decisions.
- Revenue from Alberta Education will be sufficient to maintain all operations in a manner consistent with operations in the 2014-15 school year.
- Fee revenue will be increased by \$5.8 million year-over-year due primarily to enrolment growth. Consistent with current budget principles, fee revenue for transportation, noon supervision and Instructional Supplies and Materials (ISM) will fully fund the gap between targeted Alberta Education funding and direct program costs, including waivers and uncollectible accounts. There will be no contribution from the instructional budget to support fee-based programs and services. Fee levels are subject to change given budget direction from Alberta's new government. Attachment I includes information regarding the fees proposed in this interim budget.
- The 2015-16 budget is balanced without the use of reserves. The CBE is committed to working collaboratively with the Government of Alberta regarding the use of available reserves to support student learning and advancing the CBE's and government's learning agenda. The amount of available reserves as at August 31, 2015 is projected to be between 2% and 3% of total CBE revenue.
- Non-facility capital project spending will be \$25.4 million, in order to invest in strategic projects that will sustain critical systems and enable the system to better accommodate student learning needs and enrolment growth in future years.
- The CBE will continue to work with Alberta Education regarding commissioning costs related to new school openings anticipated for the 2016-17 school year. These costs have not been factored into this interim budget.
- The CBE will carry on continuously improving in ways that benefit students and their learning as well as continue to advance the priorities of the Chief Superintendent. It is anticipated these strategies will include:
 - The redesign of kindergarten through high school programs and services to optimize student success by supporting a variety of program choices and opportunities within the new fiscal reality,
 - Enhancing and further integrating programs and services provided by CBe-Learn, Chinook Learning, Encore, Discovering Choices and our outreach services with a view to providing each student with the best programs and services within available resources,
 - Further integrating the provision of centralized and decentralized specialized supports and services to students, teachers and schools.
 - Making school based management "easier" by streamlining the provision of administrative services and supports to schools and moving to further standardization in non-teaching supports,
 - Evaluating the current model of the RAM to schools,
 - Seeking further operational efficiencies where appropriate.
- Service Unit budgets have been maintained in this interim budget to provide the same levels of service to students and schools as in the 2014-15 school year, subject to continuous improvement and operational efficiency reviews as mentioned above. Ultimate service levels may be impacted by provincial government budget decisions.
- As required by law, the budget for 2015-16 is balanced.

5 | Financial Impact

Overall balanced position.

The CBE will achieve a balanced position for this operating budget for 2015-16 after taking into account:

- assumed revenues and projected expenses identified above for 2015-16;
- maintaining operations and planning activities at the same level as for the 2014-15 school year for both schools and service units;
- funding enrolment and maintaining class size; and
- maintaining school fees at a level consistent with 2014-15 school year, except for Noon Supervision fees, which are expected to increase, subject to the final provincial budget, by \$5 for each type of service.

6 | Implementation Consequences

The approval of the 2015-16 Interim Budget will meet the requirement to balance the budget and to submit a budget to Alberta Education by May 31.

This interim budget is subject to future provincial budget direction. In the event future budget direction is materially different from the assumptions included in this report, Administration will submit to the Board of Trustees any material changes in a final budget report. The timing of that final budget report is not known at this time.

Any significant difference in funding for amounts to be allocated to schools in the RAM may mean that certain decisions that have been made by principals regarding school organization and planning would need to be revisited and changed. This will be done prospectively and as soon as practicable based on provincial government budget timelines.

7 | Conclusion

The 2015-16 Interim Budget with planned total revenues of \$1,278.6 million, total expenditures of \$1,278.6 million and \$25.4 million in non-facility capital acquisitions is balanced and complies with the Board of Trustees' policies, as well as the provisions of the Alberta Education Funding Framework, and the School Act.

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2015-16 Fees (supplementary information)

The CBE charges fees for instructional supplies and materials (ISM), transportation, noon supervision and other incidentals. ISM fees are mandatory and charged per student whereas transportation and noon supervision are only charged for students using those services. Fees are set in the spring prior to the school year and are set at a level to cover the estimated cost of providing those services. Any surplus resulting from these programs is added to a related reserve to keep fees at a minimum in future years.

Because of rapid enrolment growth and a lack of schools close to where students live means that ever more students are being transported and supervised over the noon hour. As well, the growing gap between (proposed) funding received to support students and the costs of doing so meant that we were (prior to 2014-15) spending increasing amounts of instructional dollars to subsidize fees. While providing transportation and noon supervision have evolved to become part of our modern education system, they are separate from student learning. Reflecting on our values of students come first and learning is our central purpose, a practice was established to eliminate any subsidy to fee programs from instructional funds.

Eliminating any central budget support for fees means that all the costs of providing transportation, noon supervision and instructional supplies and materials are funded by targeted provincial grants and reserves (where available), and parent fees. Costs of providing the services include direct labour and supplies, as well as the cost of fee waivers and uncollectible accounts.

To keep fees as low as possible, the CBE is committed to being as efficient as possible in the provision of services. In some cases this also means that transportation service levels may need to change. The CBE will consider moving towards more congregated stops to minimize the number of buses and routes. As always, student and staff safety remains our top priority and any changes will consider impacts on safety.

In keeping with our values, the CBE is continuing its comprehensive waiver process to ensure that no student is denied access to an education due to the inability to pay some or all fees. Learning is our central purpose.

There will be small increases to noon supervision fees for the 2015-16 year as a result of increased costs to deliver the program.

Transportation

There will be no fee increase for Transportation in 2015-16. Although the proposed provincial funding for transportation has been reduced, the CBE has made it a priority to maintain the level of fees. However, if funding remains at the proposed levels, service levels will need to change in order to keep costs as low as possible.

In 2015-16, the following changes have been proposed if funding is not increased:

- Calgary Transit rebates will be no longer available. Parents may claim the cost of transit on their personal income tax return
- Routes with ridership less than 15 students will be eliminated
- Students attending middle schools with charter routes will utilize Calgary Transit
- Congregated stops will be established for all alternative and regular programs
- The start and end times of certain schools will be adjusted to accommodate route partnerships with other schools

Dear Minister Dirks:

The Calgary Board of Education (CBE) requests an extension of the May 30 budget submission date as set out in the School Act due to the absence of an approved provincial budget. The proposed provincial budget introduced on March 26 no longer stands as active legislation.

As you will appreciate, with 92 per cent of our funding coming from Alberta Education, the May 30 deadline would require us to finalize a CBE budget without knowing the most important number, which is the funding coming from the Province. If the new government approves a budget with even slightly different financial directions, there could be significant implications for the CBE; even a slight change in a rate would have an impact. The CBE would not have time to plan the types of adjustments which would ensure that our budget is working in the best interests of students and the community.

The Calgary Board of Education is working on a budget that will follow the general direction set out in the March 26th budget plan. We believe we will be able to submit a 2015-16 budget by June 30, 2015 and request an extension to that date.

We look forward to a reply at your earliest convenience.

As a follow up to a question at Friday's ASBA Meeting, Marlene Lambe provided the following information by email on Feb. 9, 2015 about opportunities for trades persons to bridge to become CTS teachers:

The University of Alberta offers the CTS Bridging courses through the Bachelor of Education Secondary - Career and Technology Studies Major program to prepare journeypersons to complete their teacher preparation degree, however, applications for financial subsidy from School Authorities through the former CTS Teacher Bridging pilot project are not available for new program participants to access during their first year of university studies. Financing options may be available to participants through student loans or other financing arrangements.

Under the existing agreements, students who both complete the required 36 credits in CTS Bridging courses and practicum, AND successfully secure an employment relationship with a school jurisdiction, are eligible to be granted a CTS Letter of Authority to teach from Teacher Certification, Alberta Education. The conditions of the CTS Letter of Authority requires participants to continue to complete 6 credits annually toward the Bachelor of Education degree, and remain actively employed in a teaching position to maintain their Letter of Authority until such time as they become eligible for interim certification. Alternately, students who choose to complete the CTS Bridging courses may also choose to continue their studies until they fulfill the degree requirements, and seek employment as a teacher upon graduation.

 - 2. Eligible Student parent does not need to reside in Alberta, students under the age of 22 are fully funded

 - If attending electronically (i.e. video conference) a trustee must be physically present
 - 4. Borrowing Regulation

11 Recommendation

This report is being provided for the information of the Board. No decision is required at this time.

2 | Issue

The Board of Trustees recently reviewed the Operational Expectation policy statements and presented the proposed changes at a public Board meeting. Prior to approving the changes, the Board of Trustees require an understanding of the impact of these changes on the operation of the organization. Subsequently, on January 13, 2015, the Board of Trustees passed the following resolution:



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THAT the Chief Superintendent informs the Board of significant organizational impacts, if any, that would result from these proposed changes.

This report is the second of two to be presented in response to this resolution and includes the proposed changes to Operational Expectations 1, 9, and 11. A previous report addressing the impact of proposed changes to Operational Expectations 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10, was presented at the Board of Trustees meeting on April 7, 2015.

3 | Analysis

The impacts of the proposed revisions to the Operational Expectation policy statements for Operational Expectations 1, 9, and 11 are included in this report. Each statement has been reviewed and compared to the current statement. Differences have been identified and the potential impacts of these differences to the operation of the organization have been highlighted. Each proposed change is presented below by specific Operational Expectation.

Implications of Proposed Changes to OE 1: Global Operational Expectation

Current Statement	Proposed Statement
The Chief Superintendent shall not cause, allow, or fail to take reasonable measures to prevent any practice, activity, decision or organizational condition that is unlawful, unethical, unsafe, disrespectful, imprudent, in violation of Board policy or endangers the organization's public image or credibility	The Chief Superintendent shall not cause, allow, or fail to take reasonable measures to prevent any practice, activity, decision or organizational condition that is unlawful, unethical, unsafe, disrespectful, imprudent, in violation of Board policy or endangers the organization's credibility <u>or risks the loss of</u> public confidence.

The addition of this policy statement from Operational Expectation 1: Global Operational Expectation has the potential to impact the operation of the organization. CBE administration endeavours to act and make decisions in alignment with priorities in support of student success. The impact of this proposed change would occur with respect to the financial resources needed if strategies are required to be developed to measure, monitor and address the effects of actions and decision making on public confidence.

Implications of Proposed Changes to OE 9: Communicating With the Public

Current Statement	Proposed Statement
	9.3 Ensure that all student accommodation

	possible prior to the decision taking effect.

The addition of this policy statement will have minimal impact on the operation of the organization. Currently, administration endeavours to make student accommodation decisions far enough in advance through the preparation of both a three year system student



accommodation plan (SSAP) and a ten year student accommodation and facility strategy (SAFS) which are presented at public Board of Trustee meetings. Further, the development of the annual Capital Plan impacts and informs the three year plan as do such factors as changes in funding and demographics. The operational challenge is to strike a balance between planning far enough in advance and planning too far in advance. Maintaining public confidence in our decisions is critical and our planning strategies need to allow for both flexibility and consistency in the face of a changing landscape. A shared understanding of the reasonable timeframe constituting "as far in advance as possible" will be required.

Current Statement	Proposed Statement
	9.4 Collaborate with other levels of
	government and external partners in support
	of public education.

The proposed addition to this policy statement will have a significant impact on the operation of the organization. Currently, there are various levels of collaboration with numerous partners for differing purposes occurring within the CBE. Administration welcomes the opportunity to collaborate with others to enhance public education. The anticipated implementation of the Education Act requires school jurisdictions to collaborate with identified partners around specific aspects of public education. We must ensure as we move forward that the Operational Expectations are aligned with our legislative obligations as identified in the Education Act. This proposed policy change will require administration to monitor and report on actions already mandated by legislation thereby creating an additional layer of administrative work. Prior to moving forward, a commonly understood definition of collaboration would need to be in place to ensure that the use of collaboration would not cause the organization to be accountable or responsible for decisions it did not make, or to be out of compliance with provincial legislation. The impact of this change will be to ensure the required resources including human, material and financial are available and devoted to establish, align and maintain collaborative partnerships in addition to developing a monitoring framework to provide evidence of such collaboration. Priorities for allocating resources must include compliance with provincial legislation. This policy statement assumes a level of desire and readiness of other parties to enter into a mutually agreed upon collaborative venture in support of public education jeopardizing the organization's compliance with this policy expectation.

	9.5 Ensure that school councils have the
	information and tools to perform their
	mandated role.

The addition of this proposed policy statement will have minimal impact on the operation of the organization. School Councils are mandated by Alberta Education and consequently various resources have been developed and made available to the public. Additionally, CBE Communications department regularly provides communications with parents and school councils via newsletters and updates on the corporate website so they have the current information to support them in their advisory role. Historically, on an annual basis, there have been orientation sessions for those parents participating in school councils. Professional learning opportunities have been also provided to new principals to support them in working with their school councils. Sustainable funding is required to maintain this level of service and support provided by CBE personnel.



Implications of Proposed Changes to OE 11: Learning Environment/Treatment of Students

Current Statement	Proposed Statement
	11.6 Provide transportation services that are
	safe and reliable

The proposed addition of this policy statement would have minimal impact on the operation of the organization. CBE administration currently contracts transportation services to a third party and places high importance on such aspects as safety and reliability. Safety records and reliability of service statistics are regularly reviewed and monitored. Parameters are embedded in the contracts of these service providers to ensure a shared understanding of the importance and feasibility of reliable and safe service.

Current Statement	Proposed Statement
	11.7 Ensure that no student will be denied access to instructional programs due to an
	inability to pay.

Currently our organization has a belief that supports this statement. Processes are in place to support waiver requests to assist those families in accessing programs. This information is shared with the public in several ways utilizing various channels. Additionally fees are set in such a way that balances the requirement to fund specific services and programs with the overall revenue received by the CBE. Administration will need to review and monitor the fee revenue situation along with expenditures to ensure decisions are fiscally prudent. This could impact the operation of the organization by requiring administration to redirect funds to support access for all. The proposed addition of this statement could have an additional significant impact on the operation of the organization since the circumstances pertaining to how fees are determined are changing as indicated in the Education Act. Determining an effective way to monitor this value from several perspectives presents significant challenges from an operational and resource perspective. Firstly, it will be difficult to construct an indicator and provide evidence of incidents that do not occur and secondly, determining both a system and school manner of monitoring supplemental to self reporting has the potential to cause significant impact to the organization.

	reasonable background inquiries and checks
	prior to having contact with students.

The repositioning of this policy statement from OE 3: Treatment of Owners to OE 11 will have no impact on the operation of the organization. Currently, it is expected that all volunteers undergo police information checks prior to commencing any of their volunteer duties.



4 | Financial Impact

The proposed changes to the Operational Expectation policy statements addressed in this report will have a financial impact to the operation of the organization. These costs, in human and material resources, will be incurred through the process of research and review in revising reasonable interpretations, associated indicators and processes of collecting evidence for presentation for approval to the Board of Trustees. Additionally, it will be necessary to allocate resources to support the actions required resulting from the proposed changes in policy statements.

5 | Implementation Consequences

The depth and extent to which the proposed changes impact the operation of CBE will not be fully realized until the reasonable interpretations and associated indicators have been approved and a full monitoring cycle has been completed.

All proposed changes will require additional time and attention by Administration to review, revise or develop reasonable interpretations, associated indicators, specific measures and collection processes. In some cases, specific attention will be required to attend to changes in operations to comply with proposed policy statements. This work will impact the operation of CBE as resources will be required to be allocated to complete these tasks.

6 | Conclusion

This report provides a comprehensive, concise review of the perceived impact of the proposed policy statement changes to five Operational Expectations. The impacts range from minimal to significant and have both financial and operational implications. These impact statements are limited to the current theoretical understanding of the proposed changes. Further impacts and implications to the operation of the organization may be identified through the establishment of reasonable interpretation and indicators.

1 | Recommendation

It is recommended:

• This report is being provided for information for the Board. No decision is required at this time.

2 | Issue

The Chief Superintendent is required to provide the Board of Trustees with an update regarding the status of new and replacement facilities under development or construction.



3 | Background

Following the demolition of the old Ernest Manning High School, the National Sport School was moved temporarily into leased office accommodation at Calgary Olympic Park. On September 26, 2012, the Alberta Government approved provincial funding of \$3 million for the National Sport School on the condition that the Calgary Board of Education (CBE) funds an additional \$6 million for a total project value of \$9 million. The proposed new National Sport School at Canada Olympic Park is on hold, subject to funds being raised to enable a construction start in 2015. Discussions have recommenced with WinSport on potential funding strategies and options.

On July 7, 2012, the Alberta Government approved provincial funding for the Booth Centre modernization for Chinook Learning Services. In June 2013, significant damage occurred to the building as a result of the Calgary floods. Engineering and insurance assessments have been finalized. Meetings have been held with the Alberta Government (Justice, Infrastructure and Education) and the Calgary Municipal Land Corporation to review different concepts for the potential redevelopment of Booth Centre site with a private developer. Discussions are ongoing.

On May 1, 2013, the Alberta Government announced the approval of six new schools for the CBE as part of Building Alberta Schools Construction Program (BASCP). This was the fourth phase of a Provincial alternative procurement program. The six schools included the North East High School, two middle schools located in Royal Oak and Saddle Ridge and three K-4 schools located in Copperfield, Evanston and New Brighton.

On January 21, 2014, the Alberta Government announced the approval of four major modernizations for the CBE. The four projects are: Christine Meikle School – A New Replacement, Harold W Riley School – An Aboriginal Family School Modernization, Jack James High School – A Modernization and Bowness High School - A Modernization.

On February 10, 2014, the Alberta Government announced the approval of six new schools for the CBE as part of the Provincial Government's commitment to build 50 new schools. The six schools include three K-4 schools located in Auburn Bay, Panorama and Tuscany and three middle schools located in Evergreen, McKenzie Towne and New Brighton-Copperfield.

On February 12, 2014, the Alberta Government advised that CBE's request for capital funding to rebuild Elbow Park School had been approved by the Flood Relief Ministerial Task Force.

On March 11, 2014, the Alberta Government also advised that Elbow Park School was eligible for flood mitigation funding up to \$2.5 million. The new school will be built on the original site and will incorporate flood mitigation in the design. On March 13, 2015, the Alberta Government advised that the CBE's request for flood mitigation funding had been approved.



On March 11, 2014, the Alberta Government advised that Rideau Park School was eligible for flood mitigation funding up to \$2.5 million. These funds will be used to implement measures that will better protect the school infrastructure to ensure that the facility is able to withstand future flood events. On March 13, 2015, the Alberta Government advised that CBE's request for flood mitigation funding had been approved.

In June 2014, the Provincial Government announced that they would not be pursuing the BASCP school package, that was originally announced in May 2013, and that these new schools, with the exception of the North East High School, would be handed over to the CBE for development and construction.

On September 22, 2014, the Provincial Government announced a \$30.6 million investment for four starter schools in Calgary. These schools will be located in West Springs/Cougar Ridge (middle school), Cranston (middle school), Saddle Ridge (elementary school) and Aspen Woods (elementary school). In addition \$2.8 million of funding has been approved for the supply and installation of modular classrooms for Westgate School and \$1.0 million for the design development of the new high school in South East Calgary.

On October 8, 2014, the Provincial Government announced Phase 3 of a consolidated advancement of education capital projects. The new projects for the CBE included the design of schools located in Martindale and Silverado (elementary schools) and Springbank Hill/Discovery Ridge (elementary/middle school). In addition, the designs of two major modernization projects at Lord Beaverbrook and James Fowler High Schools were approved.

In November 2014, Alberta Education granted the CBE flexibility regarding the use of modular classroom capital originally intended for Westgate School. A revised plan has been developed to install additional modular units to the Glenmeadows School, which is scheduled to be returned from a charter school use to the CBE in September 2016.

On February 19, 2015, the Provincial Government advised the CBE that the four starter schools announced in September 2014 would proceed as full build-out developments, subject to the CBE committing to completing the middle schools by December 2016 and the elementary schools by September 2016.

On March 31, 2015, the Premier announced that the Province was proceeding ahead with the construction of the Phase 3 schools announced in 2014. They included four new schools and two modernization projects.

4 | Analysis

Information on the current status of the projects under development and being administered by the CBE and Alberta Infrastructure is provided in **Attachment I.**

The locations of the various new school and modernization capital projects under development are shown in **Attachment II**.



The following fifteen Project Steering Committees have been setup for the twenty four school projects being managed by CBE Administration:

- Aboriginal Learning Centre
- Christine Meikle School
- Bowness HS
- Jack James HS
- Elbow Park ES
- Evergreen MS (Bundle 1)
- Panorama Hills ES, Tuscany ES, Auburn Bay ES, McKenzie Towne MS and New Brighton-Copperfield MS (Bundles 2 and 3)
- Royal Oak and Saddle Ridge MS (Bundle 4)
- Evanston ES (Bundle 5)
- Copperfield and New Brighton ES (Bundle 6)
- West Springs and Cranston Starter MS (Bundle 7)
- Saddle Ridge and Aspen Woods Starter K-4 School (Bundle 8)
- Springbank Hill/Discovery Ridge K-9 (Bundle 10)
- Martindale and Silverado ES (Bundle 11)
- Seton High School.

These Steering Committees are scheduled to meet on a monthly basis. Individual project management committees meet on a more frequent basis.

The status of the BASCP North East High School, being managed by Alberta Infrastructure, is provided in **Attachment I.**

The Province also recently announced their approval of a modernization project at Sir William Van Horne High School, which is currently leased to Westmount Charter School.

Modular Classrooms

Administration submitted the 2015/16 Modular Classroom Plan, which was approved by the Board on October 14, 2014, to the Province for approval. This request included 28 modular classrooms in eleven CBE schools. On January 22, 2015, the Province advised that 19 modular classrooms were approved.

Details of these new modular units are provided in Attachment III.

A map showing the locations of the modular receiving schools is shown in **Attachment IV.**

An internal project team has been set up to administer the roll-out and installation of these modular classrooms.



Photos of the commencement of construction work are shown on Attachment V.

5 | Conclusion

This report provides the current update on the status of new and modernized CBE facilities under development or construction by the CBE and Alberta Infrastructure.

It is provided to the Board of Trustees as monitoring information in compliance with Operational Expectation 8: Communication With and Support for the Board.

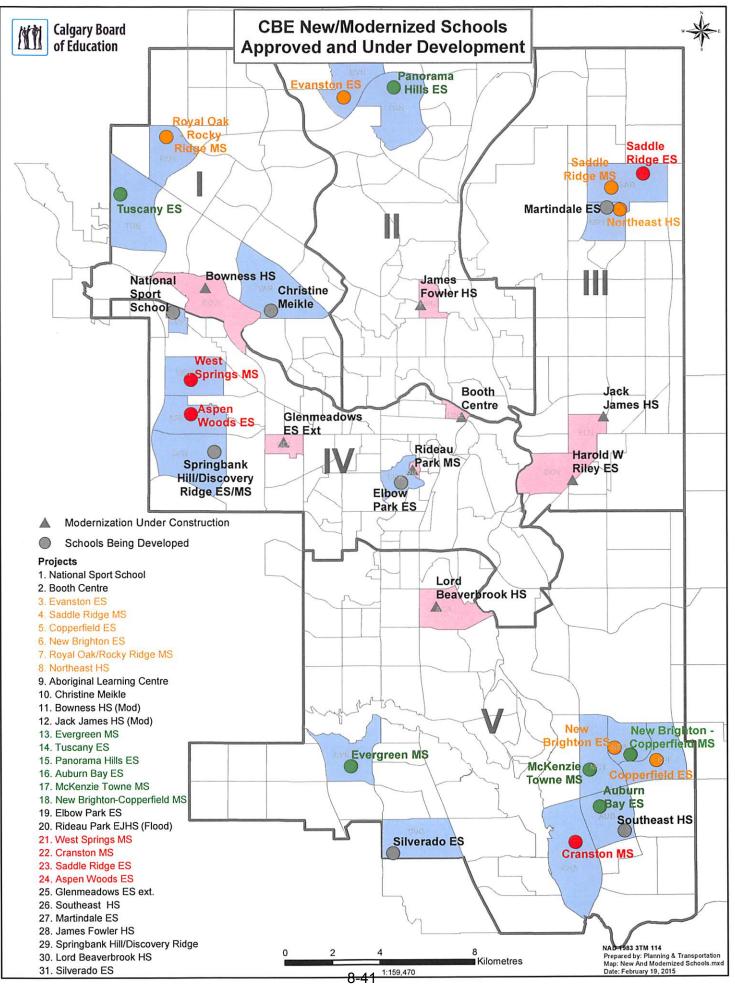

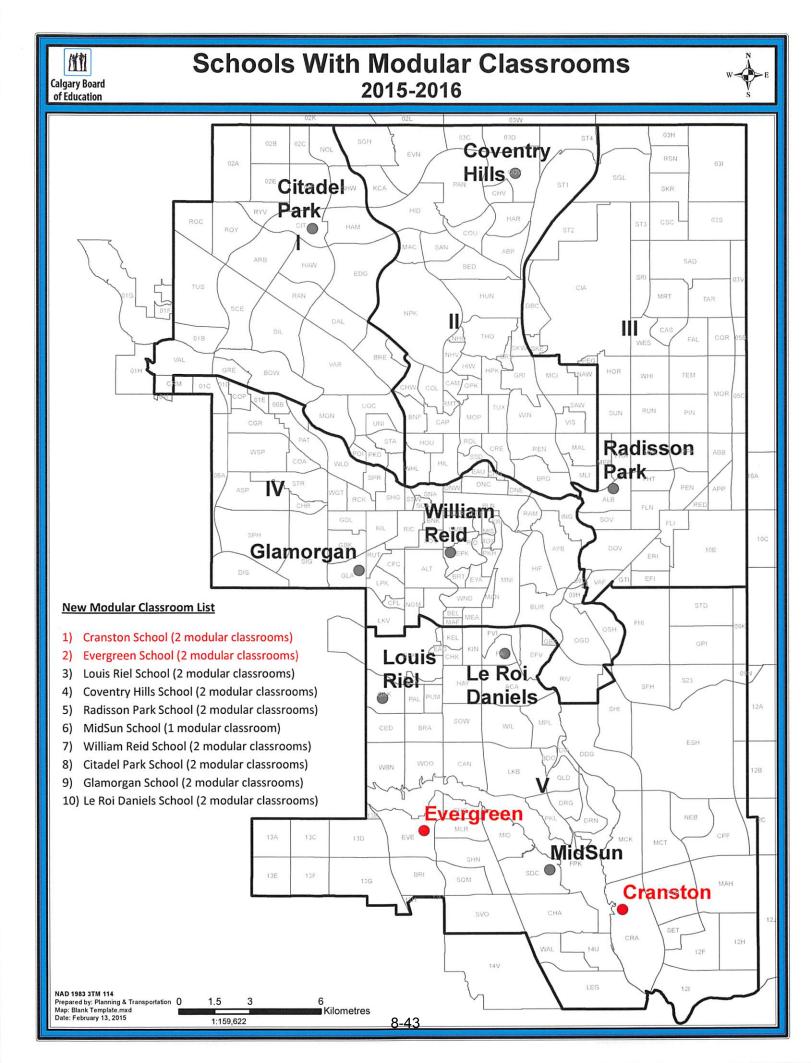
