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## Introduction to the Veterinary Profession (3-0-0 hrs) - AHT 1050

### 1. General Areas of Competency

- Identify different practice types and the services they offer.
  - Describe various roles within the veterinary industry.
  - Identify provincial legislation directly related to the veterinary profession.
  - Identify important associations and resources for the veterinary team.
- B. Develop learning and career goals based on strengths, areas to develop, interests, skills and talents.  
Outcomes:
- Identify interests, values or skills to set learning, life or career goals.
  - Explore strategies and resources that support personal growth in learning and career pathways.
  - Participate in a supportive collaborative learning environment.
  - Create a plan to build healthy relationships which support the growth and well-being of self and others.
  - Develop strategies for optimism, flexibility and resilience when adapting to new situations and transitions.
  - Develop a personal philosophy towards learning and working in the animal health industry.

  - Apply strategies to improve interpersonal communication skills.
- D. Apply general rules to veterinary medical word building and analysis.  
Outcomes:
- Describe general rules to word building and analysis.
  - Describe directional terms.
  - Identify and define body parts of selected species of dogs, cats, cows and horses.
  - Identify common terms used for animals.
- E. Apply critical thinking to animal welfare situations.  
Outcomes:
- Identify the history of animal welfare and the animal welfare spectrum.
  - Investigate animal welfare associations and resources in the animal health industry.
  - Describe The Five Freedoms.
  - Develop critical thinking skills.
  - Identify animal legislation in Alberta and Canada.

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
